## Continue Student Learning Over Winter Break

Even during the winter holidays, learning opportunities for your student are everywhere.

- **Go to a museum.** The best way to get your student excited about learning is to bring them to a museum where they can learn more about their interests. If they are interested in sea creatures, take them to an aquarium. They will be excited to learn more about topics that they are interested in and excited that you are trying to do something specifically geared towards them. At home you can create a crossword puzzle or word search based on things that you and your child saw.
- **Play a game.** There are a lot of educational games out there today that are also fun. Plan a family game night each week during the winter break and if you have the time keep it going through the year. Play games such as Scrabble to learn new words or Trivial Pursuit to learn new facts.
- **Keep a winter break diary.** Have your child keep a winter break diary where they write down all of the things that they did during their winter break. This will help them keep up their writing skills.
- **Read a book, then watch the movie.** Both you and your child could read a book that has a movie made about it. Have your child explain the book with you before you watch the movie and then tell you the differences after you watch the movie. This will help your child with speaking, finding the similarities and differences between things, and listening.

## What is the College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI)?

CCRPI is Georgia's annual tool for measuring how well its schools, districts, and the state itself are preparing students for the next educational level. It provides a comprehensive roadmap to help educators, parents, and community members promote and improve college and career readiness for all students.

The CCRPI includes five main components each scored on a scale of 0 to 100: Achievement, Progress, Closing Gaps, Readiness, and Graduation Rate (high school only). These components, encompassing multiple indicators, are combined for a total CCRPI score on a scale of 0 to 100. The CCRPI also reports other information, such as the performance of student subgroups, school climate and financial efficiency status.

The state index is intended to help parents and the public better understand how schools are performing compared to others in the district and state. The CCRPI also reports other information such as the performance of student subgroups, school climate and financial efficiency status.

## English Learners (EL) Families
